Lesson Title: Kindergarteners Making Predictions

Subject/Grade Level: English Language Arts, Kindergarten

Materials Needed

- The Very Busy Spider by Eric Carle—book or video

- Paper and colors for drawing

Lesson Procedures

(Before starting the lesson, parent should review **Making Predictions!** image on page 2)

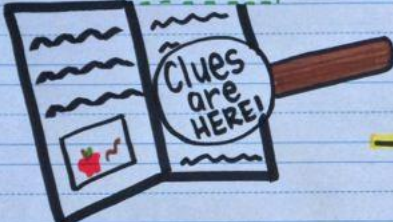
- Talk about spiders.
 - What do you know about spiders?
 - Where do you see spiders?
 - What do you think spiders do?
 - What do you think our story will be about?
- Prepare children to make predictions.
 - What is a guess?
 - Can a guess be wrong?
 - Can pictures and text help us make a guess?
 - Is a prediction and a guess the same?
- View the Very Busy Spider video while stopping to ask children what will happen next.
- Give children an example: “I predict there will be another animal that comes to the spider, because it has already happened.”
- Stop before the end of the video and ask children: What do you predict the spider will say to the rooster?
- Give children time to respond and then show the end of the video.

- Talk about the story after seeing the video or reading the book.
 - What happened first?
 - What happened next?
 - How did the story end?
- Extension:
 - Children could draw a picture of their favorite animal in the story.
 - Imagine other animals and predict what they might say to the spider.
 - Example: Along came a javelina. Want to munch a prickly pear?
 - Write your own story together.
 - Imitate each of the animals in the story including the sounds they make.
