Materials Needed

- Before showing the video, discuss the five themes of geography listed below
 - 1. Location

Where are things located? A location can be absolute (for example, latitude and longitude or a street address) or relative (for example, explained by identifying landmarks, direction, or distance between places).

2. Place

Characteristics that define a place and explains what makes it different from other places. These differences can take many forms including physical or cultural differences.

3. Human Environment Interaction

This theme explains how humans and the environment interact with each other. Humans adapt and change the environment while depending upon it.

4. Region

Geographers divide the earth into regions making it easier to study. Regions are defined in many ways including area, vegetation, political divisions, etc.

5. Movement

People, items, and ideas (mass communication) move and help shape the world.

Lesson Procedures

- Announce that children will be watching a video about the five themes of geography.
- Show children the video and ask them for examples of the five themes that they saw.
- Children then are given photos of different geographical locations in the United States
- Children use the graphic organizer to record their observations.
- Parent(s) and children discuss the recorded observations.
- Extension:
 - Select one of the locations and plan a family trip there.
 - What type of clothes would you need to pack?
 - What would be the best season to visit?
 - What food would you eat there?
 - Find someone who lives in one of the areas and write a letter to that person asking about anything you observed and recorded on the graphic organizer.
 - Research more about each of the three photos on the internet
